WOOD BADGE 2124 PATROLS ROCK-IT!

The patrols of Wood Badge 2124 raced into space yesterday with the launch of their model rockets into overcast skies. The rain that cooled the temperatures subsided just in time for the patrols to rocket into history.

“Bigger rockets run on mixtures of hydrogen and oxygen, and our rockets do too—just in a version that’s safer to handle,” stated a spokesperson from the Gilwell Rocket Science Center. Our rockets run on compressed air and water, delivering a thrust that propels them nearly out of sight.

Recovery teams were able to locate their sub-orbital craft in relatively fine shape. The recovery deployment system has been known fail in the past, resulting in a high speed reentry that severely modify the nose cone design.

I will use low-impact methods of hiking and camping.


BE CONSERVATION MINDED.
